Here is a bit of history for Oklahomans as this is definitely a "regional" tune.

Between the years of 1875 ad 1896 it was said that 164 men were sentenced to the gallows by Judge Isaac Parker of Ft. Smith, Arkansas. As United States District Judge, his jurisdiction extended over a part of Arkansas and about 70,000 square miles of untamed land to the west, including the Indian territory that would later become Oklahoma. His was the only court until 1889, when it became possible to appeal to the US Supreme Court. *Until that time, his decision was final.* During his reign he began to be called "the hanging judge" With typical buffoonery, fiddlers started a comical tune in his honor. Also called "Take the Shackles Off" and "Take Your Shackles Off of Me," "Judge Parker" or "Old Judge Parker"

Oklahomans Woody Guthrie and Bobby Barnett both sang songs about the famous judge. (ref: The Fiddle Book - Marion Thede)
